LOANING MATERIALS AND EQUIPMENT TO OTHERS

The materials and equipment that patrons check out from us are assigned to an individual account. These items are the patron's responsibility to take care of and keep track of. Materials include audio Bibles, audio magazines, digital and large print books, and descriptive videos. Equipment includes digital players and headphones.

Equipment and materials sent to our patrons are property of the United States Federal Government (Library of Congress) and the Talking Book Services (TBS). They are on loan to patrons of Talking Book Services. Equipment and books should never be loaned to others, thrown away, sold, or donated to charities such as Goodwill.

Sharing items among patrons is discouraged for several reasons. First, materials are easily misplaced or lost. It is also very easy to forget who you loaned items to. Second, if you share materials with other TBS patrons, your account's ability to have any more items sent out is negatively affected. Items are still on the original account until they are checked in by us.

The best thing to do if you want to recommend a title to a friend who is a TBS patron is to have them call and order their own copy and not loan the copy you have. If patrons need a copy of the Bible, and do not already have a copy checked out to them, please call us and we will send them one. Also, please remember that individuals who are not registered TBS patrons cannot use any of our books or equipment.

On Thursday, October 18, 2018, Talking Book Services held a very special author talk and book signing with Michael Hingson, blind survivor of the 9/11 attack and author of *Thunder Dog.* He shared in detail his journey as a blind man working in the corporate world and his passion for advocating for himself and for the blind on a local and national level. He described his experience during the terrorist attack on the Twin Towers on 9/11 and how, with the assistance of his guide dog Roselle, he made his way down from the 79th floor. He also shared the technology he currently uses to maintain his independence. Those in attendance were extremely pleased with his presentation.
